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TIME OUT FOR WOMEN

In the UK there are estimated to be 1 million businesses with predominantly female ownership, of which the vast majority are 'one women bands'. But only 4% of women in the South East are classified as entrepreneurs, just over half the figure for men. Yet in reality women are much more suited to running their own businesses; they are more likely to be innovative, more likely to be technology oriented and they are more natural networkers.¹

So what's the problem? Research shows that women are naturally more cautious, with greater concerns about their family's financial security, and they have a greater fear of failure than men.

Against this background, two local female entrepreneurs have set up a programme to help women be even more successful in business. Lucia Bardoul explains: "As we looked at what was available, it seemed as though there was a gap in the market. There are lots of government funded schemes for women starting up in business, and there are some events for high growth entrepreneurs, but it seemed to us that once a business is established, the support for a female entrepreneur dries up. This is one of the reasons why expansion of female owned businesses may be being limited."

It is also recognised that employed professional women facing concerns around advancement and role satisfaction, may be looking for support to overcome these barriers too. Could the issues that keep both women from achieving their goals be similar? Employed professionals may also make excellent entrepreneurs but may be holding back from setting up on their own. "We thought it would be interesting for these two groups to work together", explained Philippa Varey. "Many of these women would like to work in a different way, but cannot imagine how they could achieve it. By bringing together employed and entrepreneurial women each group can see how the other half live and work, and help them to see possibilities for change."
